The children worked incredibly well together, reading with expression, helping each other with tricky words and enjoying general book talk. They can't wait to do it again!







































The children loved being able to chat to their friends about the book that they are reading, discussing characters and themes!

And grew ...


And grew...

reclaim his place at the top of the food chain!


New releases for ages 8-11
